CHILD SLAVES IN BUFFALO BOX FACTORIES

Inspection a Farce, and the Split Finger is a Badge of the Trade, Taken as a Matter of Course.

A revolting picture which the working class of Buffalo knows from experience to be all too true, is uncovered by the New York World in its exposure of the conditions of the children in Buffalo's box factories. Note that it is the New York World exposing conditions in Buffalo. The New York World says that the children in the Buffalo box factories are kept in filthy, overcrowded conditions in Lawrence, Mass. but the Buffalo papers gladly print articles showing the evil conditions in Lawrence, Mass. but the Buffalo papers are silent about the truth about conditions in Buffalo, where it would be read by the "prominent citizens" who ride in luxury out of the profits wrung from the sweat and blood of the Buffalo children—well you can expect nothing from the local capitalist papers.

Remember that the World has nothing to say about the children of New York's east side sweatshops. The Lawrence papers had nothing to say about the frightful conditions in Lawrence, hence you can appreciate the attitude of the Buffalo capitalist papers. The World does not print this series because it is so fond of the workers in any place, but because it will help to "make circulation" without hurting the feelings of New York advertisers. The World says:

"Manufacturers in Buffalo regard inspections as mere jobs, because the inspectors do not visit them more than once a year, and then kindly converse with the manager for twenty minutes or so while some time-fotted underling glances almost the factory from a general clasp and shouting out of the back door such children as are under the legal age.

The inspectors do not get enough offense because there are not enough of them. There is no question about this, or that the men are diligent. When the commission visited here early last winter there were but two inspectors in what is termed the Buffalo District. This takes in Erie, Niagara, Orleans and Genesee counties and includes Buffalo with its 150,000 factories, Lockport and Niagara Falls. This means that each inspector had over 1,000 factories on his list.

Slaves of the Machines.
The state inspectors have good luck they round up all the best factories once a year. These factories make paper boxes and they need watching for the reason that they employ many boys and girls. What is more

TONAWANDA BUBBLING OVER WITH EXCITEMENT
Tonawanda, N. Y.—Well, of all the worst things that could happen in the two cities (the home of quiet and contented workers) Everybody is doing it. What? Striking for more wages in order to live.

The molasses in the Niagara Radiator Works would not stand for the company forcing extra work which belong to another branch work, onto them, and strike out the rest striking well. The small police force at the plant it looks as though the men mean business and will stay until they get what they want, regardless of what the Evening News predicts as a speedy return to work at company's terms.

The laborers at the Buffalo Steel Company's plant are still out. The men are not getting any more increase in pay for a bit—rather the others to return. The Company is now advertising in Buffalo newspapers for laborers to break the strike. Tonawanda men stay at home.

The street department of Tonawanda was crippled a few days ago when the laborers demanded a raise from 1575 cents to 20 cents an hour and a work day of 8 hours instead of 10 as they have been compelled to work in the past. Their demand was refused, and a number struck and are still out, with many of the ablest and highest authorities, as it is against the law to work longer than 8 hours if they didn't want to. REPUBLICAN LEADERS ENEMIES OF LABOR

There are six ax-wielded enemies of labor in the Republican National Committee, according to the official records of the United States Congress. They are:

Boies Penrose, United States Senator from Pennsylvania; W. Murray Crane, United States Senator from Massachusetts; Richard Bartholdi, Representative from Missouri; Nathan B. Scott, former Senator from West Virginia; James A. Tawney, former Representative from Minnesota; Frank O. Lowden, former Representative from Illinois.

Penrose and Crane, who are probably the two strongest members of the Republican National Committee, have the two worst labor records in the reaction-ary United States Senate. On every labor question these Senators voted in the interest of the ruling and exploiting class. Penrose not only votes against labor legislation on the floor of the Senate, but for years has managed to kill such legislation in the committee room, by being a member of the committee on Education and Labor. Penrose is the successor of the notorious Albrink as the Republican leader of the Senate.

The third man on labor's political unfair list, Richard Bartholdi, also voted against the railroad men's sixteen-hour bill. He voted on March 1, 1907, for one of the most notorious anti-labor repealing bills introduced in Congress.

One of the bitterest foes of labor who ever sat in Congress was James A. Tawney of Minnesota. He was a member of the Committee on Appropriations he always "economized" at the expense of labor employed by the government. Tawney is the man who had the eight-hour law repealed on the ground that it was "economized" at the expense of labor employed by the government.

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NIAGARA FALLS A CITY OF DUK SHOPS AND EXPLOITERS

Pleasure Seekers are Done by Curious, Hack Trust and Hotels — Workers by Low Wages and Real Estate Sharks.

At Niagara Falls the working class are stung and going. In this city, especially the poorer class of tourist is supposed to be the real "mark." From the moment the ticket is bought until the arrival in the city.

The railroad, the park trust, the hotel, the curio store and the souvenir fakirs form the chief source of income, with gambling houses as a side attraction. Making this city a wonder as a means of getting money out of its guests.

Industrial conditions are of the worst possible kind and low wages prevail. With this state of affairs existing, competition with the effects of the hungry landlords and the business man's inclination to exploit the workers, the people were impoverished to the extent that the Salvation Army established a soup house here last winter.

REPS CONVENTION BLOW OUT THE GAS

Nomination of Taft Looks Like Political Suicide; Fulfillment of Hanna's Prophecy.

It is hard to see how any other outcome of the Republican party convention at Chicago could have been so satisfactory to Socialists as the development of last week's fiasco.

The nomination of Taft on the regular Republican ticket with the Wild Man of Oyster Bay running on an independent "rule or ruin" ticket means that both factions of the Republican party, to say nothing of the disgruntled Democrats, will have a chance to vote for their own kind of candidate in Roosevelt or Taft or the man whom the interests have decided upon to head the Democrat ticket. This means the elimination of the sore-head vote from the Socialists. The Socialist party never did in the past, and certainly does not now, desire the sore-head vote of the old parties to vote the Socialist ticket, it merely has of desiring to understand, Socialist principles.

Being rid of the disgruntled old party kickers, the Socialist vote this fall will stand for the cause of general education and will give everybody a chance to see how far Socialist education has developed.

In the last analysis, the Socialist will stand for the degree of political education attained by the workers—a thing devotedly to be desired. When any considerable number of old party "insurgents" are voting the Socialist ticket, it merely has the effect of "padding the figures," and destroying the value of the Socialist vote as a means of estimating the development of the program.

Politically, it would appear to indicate the beginning of the end for the Republican party. Plainly, the capitalists are not so foolhardy as to continue to split their vote between two

BAKERS STRIKE AGAINST EATERY TAKE SHOPS

12 and 14 Hours a Days Work in Many Non-Union Bakeries. — Long Hours and Unsanitary Conditions Breeds Disease among Men That Handle "Staff of Life".

The striking bakers in the General Baking Company's plants in this city are much elated with their success thus far in their struggle with the Bread Trust. Over half of the striking bakers, formerly employed at the Brunner plant, have secured work in union shops, and their work and that of the rest of the strikers, is causing a notice-able decline in bread which bears the union label. The demand made for the label may seem a small thing to those who are in the habit of buying the well advertised brands of bread put out by the trust in this city, but it is no small feature of the fight for the preservation of the bakers' organization and the struggle upon the part of the baker to obtain tolerable sanitary conditions in the trust bake shops in this city. It is high time the general public realized that a union-label-on-bread means that the bread is baked in sanitary bake shops with competent bakers. The workers in demanding union label bread are not only assisting the striking bakers, but are also demanding a guarantee of pure food.

The Jewish bakers, employed in the Jewish bake-shops in the East Side, are also putting up a grand battle for the organization. They are holding several strike meetings every evening along William Street, exposing unsanitary conditions in the bake-shops in the East Side and asking that the workers demand the union label on their bread.

It is reported that they are meeting with great success, that many of the employing bakers have signed an agreement to give union label bread. In a few days the rest of the employers will have accepted the demands of the strikers, and the men will be back to work.

Thousands of dollars are spent each year by the bread trust and its various auxiliaries advertising special brands of bread. The public should take into consideration that thousands of dollars spent for advertising means cheaper food and poorer paid, incompetent laborers often working 12 and 14 hours a day in unsanitary bake-shops.

Many workers killed at Eagle Park. DIVIDENDS ARE SAFE. The sickening story of the disgraceful treatment of the bodies of working men killed at Eagle Park, which is a case of political mismanagement, and the total absence of protection by the Sheriff's office is an interesting, though heart-breaking commentary on conditions under which the workers live.

It is only another proof that under capitalism the police officers are not for the protection of the working class. Just compare this conditions at Eagle Park, where thousands of workers are responsible. Profits built a cheap dock in the first place, and profits prevented any improvement which would conserve human lives.

At Black Hook the capitalists had no trouble in getting a horde of police and plain clothes men to "protect" the dock, where thousands of workers are spending their lives of the workers of their living. At Eagle Park not so much as a solitary deputy could be spared to protect the bodies of the victims of the "black hook" which were killed at Eagle Park the shore workers have been lined with armed men. The reason for this situation is simply the fact that no capitalist's dirty dollars were at stake on the Eagle Park dock where the bodies of the working class lay stark in death.

UNION CARPENTERS WIN AN INCREASE IN WAGES

United Stand of Men Forces Employers to Grant Increase to Fifty Cents Per Hour.

On January of this year the Carpenters' Union notified the contractors that on May 1st the scale of wages list would be 50 cents per hour, instead of forty-five cents which had been the scale for the past two years.

A meeting of the contractors signed on May 1st the scale of wages list. A few days was held by the union at Miller's Hall, when it was decided by an almost unanimous vote to enforce their demands. The following day many of the contractors signed the new agreement. However, on May 1st, men left their jobs to the number of 1,500 who were working for contractors who refused to grant the increase.

As individual contractors continued to sign the agreement all the men secured jobs at the new scale of wages. A meeting was called for June 10th and the strike declared to be won.

SOCIALISM AND THE GREEN REVOLUTION

Throughout the world we see evidences of a spirit of discontent breaking forth in strikes, lockouts, revolutions and wars. Even China has felt the shock, and Tientsin quivers with the foot of marching to the aid of the capitalist war for markets.

The appearance of the machine brought with it a division of society into contending groups or classes on new lines. On the one side were those who owned the machinery and whose interests lay in the class line...

It is quite clear that in the early stages of the development of machinery, when the machines were inexpensive and crude and when a few workers, by combining their savings, could become a competitor of the established capitalist; when the capitalist could not to the time just a few years before, when they themselves, in many cases, were workers like the others...
