JACKSON'S MINORITY REPORT

I have to respectfully dissent in the following particulars to the decision of the majority of the Board, composed of His Honor, Mayor L. P. Puhrmann and Mr. Bert L. Jones.

First.—Section 3. I dissent from the majority, appinion for the reason that I think the scale decided upon to be inadequate and not in accordance with the evidence.

In my opinion the wages in cost of living and the conditions of labor in such locality. In the latter I hold that this should be based largely upon the increase in wages to workmen obtained through collective rather than individual source. Sufficient evidence was presented from the side of the employes as to the advanced prices at retail of the necessary commodities that go into a workingman's home. The evidence on the part of the company attempted to show from the viewpoint of wholesale dealers that increase in cost of living had not been noticeable within the past few years. I firmly believe that this evidence should be disregarded, as the test of the matter is in the charge which the retailer makes to the consumer. It needs no documentary evidence to prove that this increase has aggregated from fifteen to twenty-five per cent within the past there years.

The evidence shows that different craftmen in this locality have received increases ranging from twelve to twenty per cent within the past three years.

Tenth—Section 15. I disagree absolutely with the award of the Board that the agreement shall run for a term of five years. I believe this to be most obnoxious to the employes. Not a scintilla of evidence was brought out that would support such a decision and with one possible exception there is no precedent for such a decision.

If the award as to wages was substantial something might possibly be said in favor of it, but as conditions are it seems very wrong that such an award should be made, and I am of the opinion that this may prove a basis for abrogation of the entire award.

Hardly have the people of this state recovered from the shock of e Husted mill disaster when another equally terrible holocaust is must before us in the case of the fire at the Binghamton (Iothing ompany's plant, where 30 people lost their lives through the neglect the proprietors to provide proper fire fighting facilities and means

It appears that there were no automatic sprinklers in the building It appears that there were no automatic sprinklers in the building and only six pails of water on each floor, no standpings and no fire hose. The stairs and stairways were made of wood, of which there was only one set. Fire escapes were placed directly in front of the windows, which became so hot that they could not be used for the purpose for which they were intended. The stairs on the fire escapes were made of two iron rungs in such a manner as to eatch the feet of the escaping girls, many 8tf, but, a getling stuck and preventing others that were behind them from coming down the ladder. It is claimed by the company that fire driller were conducted frequently, and that the girls thought that it was a drill and took their time.

The Buffalo Socialist has frequently called the attention of the Fire Marshal to buildings in this city that are not sufficiently protected against fire, and where such an incident is possible at any time, but no notice has been taken by that official, and we expect none will be until something happens; then there will be all kinds of investigations, and the proprietors, as usual, will be exonerated.
