Appeal Denied—Two-Year Prison Sentences Confront Union Victims of FBI Frame-up



Their appeal denied by the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals, in a decision made public last week. seven Drivers Union officials from Sioux City. Des Moines and Omaha must enter a federal penitentiary around August 1st to serve prison terms of two

The seven unionists are victims of a foul frame-up engineered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and employers in the Sioux City area. The six victims pictured above are (back row) W. K. Stultz, Omaha; Ralph Johnson, Sioux City; Howard Fouts, Sioux City; (front row) Francis Quinn, Des Moines; Lou Miller, Omaha; and Jack Maloney, member of Local 544 and organizer, Sioux City. The seventh mionist is E. L. Carpenter of Omaha. It is believed that all seven will be confined to Standstone prison, where Minneapolis WPA strikers and Illinois union coal miners are now serving time.

The stench of the raw deal given the seven Drivers Union officials is about as putrid as anything pulled off by the federal government against organized labor in recent years. The men were accused and convicted of an alleged destruction of a bakery truck during the Sioux City bakery drivers' strike in 1938. The FBI, on the admission of one of its agents, worked a solid year to "get" the union leaders and to build the frame-up. In denying the appeal, the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeal has chosen to overlook a score of points made by the defense council that refute and expose the shameless frameup. The defense proved that part of the evidence was crudely doctored, that other parts of the evidence were hearsay, and that the District Court had abused its discretion in the trial.

The real reason why these officials of the Drivers Unions in Sioux City, Omaha and Des Moines are being railroaded to prison for a crime they never committed is because the employers in this area, and the government, are out to weaken unionism.

President Roosevelt, if it is any satisfaction to him, can add seven more union scalps to his belt, to hang alongside the scalps of the Minneapolis WPA strikers and the numerous victims of the Department of Justice's "anti-trust" campaign against organized labor. The FBI would never have dared to move against the drivers' movement in the Middle West unless it understood that the White House approved

A New Twist?

Drivers Fined \$10,000 for 1-Day Strike

New York—For the first time in the history of American trade unionism, an arbitrator has awarded a company damages against a striking union. The arbitrator is Arthur A. Meyer, one of those "impartial" guys representing the "public" whom the horse always use The comthe bosses always use. The company is the Sheffield Farms company, part of the huge Eastern milk trust. The union is the Milk Drivers Union Local 584 of Milk Drivers Union Local 584 of New York City, which last Feb-ruary 24th conducted a one-day strike in protest against the dis-missal of three union warehouse-men by the company. The dam-ages awarded the Sheffield firm by the "impartial" arbitrator are \$10,000.

Big Business pays smart guys to lay awake nights thinking of new ways to strike at organized labor, but this is the first time the bosses ever conceived the trick of raiding a union treas-ury on the phoney charge that the union had violated its contract, struck, and thus damaged

the company.

To sugar-coat the pill, Arbitrator Meyer suggested the company cut the figure in half—
"for the sake of maintaining
amicable labor relations." What the bosses are interested in is establishing a precedent where by they can provoke a union into striking, and then rob the

union treasury.

Meyer's decision was made public Sunday.

Four hundred members of Four hundred members of Local 584 had struck for one day February 24th when the company fired warehousemen loading trailer trucks at the Bronx depot.
