It is more than apparent to anyone reading the daily newspapers that the men who now control our government-both in Washington and on Wall Street-think of the working masses of the people as incapable of thought. In other words, we are dumb. We can swallow anything which they want to dish out, all in the name of "pa-triotism." They shout, through every medium of publicity which they have at their command that what this country needs is a little "sacrifice" if it is going to continue in the "American Way." They raise a hue and cry from here to China every time the carelessness and criminal negligence of some munitions maker or chemical manufacturer causes an explosion which takes the lives of hunalarm every time there is a strike -calling for "national unity," etc.

And then with inconsistency which is beautiful in its implications they issue state-ments like the one which came from Admiral Spear of the Navy Department yesterday. To wit:

The Walsh Healy Act, the Excess Profits Taxes, and the Minimum Wage standards are responsible for the fact that the big steel and iron companies are refusing to bid on government contracts!" (True, by the way.)

In the rapid change of economic conditions throughout the entire world, the actual producers, farmers and industrial workers are destined to play an ever increasingly important part, for if civilization is to continue to advance and democracy prevail, cooperation must supplant competition. The natural alliance in this march toward a higher state of civilization is between farmers and industrial workers. And, an organization, such as the Farmer Cooperative Labor Council, whose purpose is to develop understanding and coordination between these two groups, serves as a connecting link for them.

FARM INCOME RISES WITH CITY WAGES

The economic history of the United States demonstrates that whenever the prices of agricultural commodities fall and become demoralized, it results in chaos in all industrial activities; while on the other hand, if agriculture is in a healthy economic condition all industries in America prosper . . The farmer of today, as, in the past, is almost entirely left to the well. mercy of the elements, the grain gamblers, and the crafty commodity price manipulators. The Board of Trades, the railroads and banking syndicates are arbitrarily setting the price of what the farmer produces, and they are also setting the price of farm machinery and all commodities that he must buy. If it is good, shrewd, practical business to guarantee a certain rate of income and profit for our railroads, telephone companies, electric light companies, insurance companies, and others, why should not the same economic principles apply to agriculture? Why should agriculture be asked to shift for itself when other industries have a price structure which guarantees an income based on capitalization and service rendered? How long would our railroad and public utilities last if they were compelled to endure the price fluctuations characteristic of agricul ture? It would not be very long before such extreme price varia tions would completely cripple them. However, the farmer is expected to thrive under such a system. Wheat may sell for \$1.00 a bushel today and three months from today, the same grade of wheat sells for \$.60 a bushel, with the price of all other farm commodities produced by the farmer, varying accordingly. Yet the farmer is expected to pay the fixed charges, guaranteeing a profit and the cost of production of all services and articles he requires, freight rates included. Such unfair



Fargo Union On Strike Vs. Adams

Fargo, N. D.-Since November Union Local 116 has been involved in a strike against the profit-mad Adams Transfer & Storage company, the only outfit in town that has refused to sign a union agree-

The Adams company, which has fought the union since 1934, is trying to operate with scabs and thugs working under police protection. The finks sleep in the plant nights and are guarded by cops. Among the better-known finks Oker brothers, Ben Hoddin and Arthur Taylor.

Several union pickets have been picked up by the police on trumped-up charges, but are now out on bond. The cops have a batch of John Doe warrants which they are seeking to use at every occasion where it might weaken the strike.

The Adams company handles the products of Union Carbide, of the Linde Air Products company, is a distributor for General Foods, and handles pick-up freight for the three railroads.

The union is demanding the same wage scale that all other truck lines have agreed to pay. This reasonable demand has been met by a stony refusal to negotiate.

The man who is in charge of the strike for the company is a fellow named Bill Thompson, who used to be a helper there but married the boss's daughter. As is usual in such cases, Thompson fights the striking workers with unusual venom.

The Case of Nick Wagner

It is extremely important that each member of organized labor really understands what is labor's stake in the latest ruling of District Court Judge Paul S. Carroll in the latest ruling of District Court Judge Faul B. Callon in the celebrated fink suit against the Minneapolis General Reinstated

In the court's original decision October 1st, Judge Carroll ordered the union to remove President Carl Skoglund from office. In its latest decision November 29th, the court orders the union to remove Trustee Nick Wag-

However, there is a great difference in the basis for the court's action in the two orders, and it is this difference that must be grasped.

The court ordered Skoglund removed from office on the SOLE reason that he was not a citizen. Skoglund's honesty, his efficiency, his conduct, were not challenged by the court. The court pointed out that there is a provision in the International Brotherhood of Teamsters by-laws that provides that non-citizens cannot hold office in an affiliated union. What the court did in this case was to order the union to observe a union by-law. Though Local 544, together with many other workers, may feel that this by-law is archaic and backward, and that it is always dangerous for an enemy court to meddle in the internal affairs of a union, yet the General Drivers Union was willing to submit to this court order.

The case of Nick Wagner is in a different category. The court has ordered Wagner removed, not because he is in violation of any union rule or by-law, local or International, but BECAUSE OF HIS ACTIONS IN CARRYING OUT A DECISION OF THE UNION EXECUTIVE BOARD. What do the finks and the court say that Nick Wagner is guilty of? That he "threatened" bosses and finks. What are the FACTS in this case?

In 1937 Local 544 was engaged in a strike against the Mazey florist shop. The owner of this shop is known for her fanatical hatred and contempt for organized labor. The union designated Wagner to confer with the Mazey company and seek to settle the dispute. An argument ensued and Wagner ably defended the union and the right of Mazey employees to receive the benefits of the union contract signed by the Mazey company. The finks got this boss to testify that Wagner "threatened" her.

Again, an organizer for the fink "Local Number One" was seeking to solicit drivers to join that company-union was seeking to solicit drivers to join that company-union outfit. Local 544 sent Wagner to talk to the man and induce him to cease his foul activity. Wagner talked trade-union language to this fink. Later the fink testified that Wagner "threatened" him.

A few Local 544 men have tangled with him on various occasions, but Wagner is not among

But regardless of the truth or falsity of the fink's charges against Wagner, the court has decreed that Nick Wagner be removed from the post of union trustee for a two-year period, and that he be ineligible to hold an elective or appointive post in the union.

The court seeks to remove Wagner because he carried out instructions of the union in dealing with a vicious boss and a conscienceless fink.

If the legal precedent is permitted to stand whereby a court can reach into a union, nullify the democratic sentiment of the membership and remove a union man from office, it means that every active unionist in the United States is in danger, sooner or later, of being so victimized. Nothing less than this is at stake in the Wagner case. Don't think the national associations of the employers don't hire people to comb the legal records for just such precedents as this to add to their arsenal of

This is the reason that Local 544's executive board, its stewards, and now its membership have voted unanimously to take the stand that Nick Wagner is an officer in good standing; that he be nominated for re-election; and that the case be appealed to the state supreme court.

This is the reason that the Building Trades Council and the Minneapolis Central Labor Union's executive board have voted to support Local 544 in its fight to knock this potentially dangerous weapon out of the hands votion as all the world knows .of the employers.
