### INFLUENCE OF THE I. W. W.

I. W. W. methods are gaining ground. The demand for a general strike in connection with the West Virginia episode is being eral strike in connection with the West Virginian episode is being voiced again, principally among the West Virginians themselves. In Kansas City a general strike in aid of the building trades council is urged. In Naugee, Mich., the Socialists are filling jails in a free speech fight against the Mayor, who is the superintendent of the local steel trust plant, and wants no agitation among the trust's slaves. A movement is judged, not only by its own accomplishments, but also by its influence on other movements. When so judged, the I. W. W. is a great factor indeed, as it is largely as a result of its agitation that the above methods are now advocated and used.

The I. W. W. is doing more good work than appears on the surface. A triend writes a personal letter telling of the agitation being done in a New Engiano town. Two meetings in different spheres on two successive nights were held, but no news of it got into our press. Say, what have we got a press for anyhow? All persons are interested in a live movement. To snow them that the I. W. W. is alive, we must enronned its doings. And with our own press chronneling such doings from all over the country, that press will assert itself as a power in labor journalism. Get wise; and drop a line to our own papers about our own doings.

Talking about the predominance of the East as an industrial center, the question may be asked how about the Panama Canal and its influence on the Middle West and the Pacific Coast? There is much evidence going to show that the capitalists anticipate a great development of these sections as a result of the opening of the big cut. This is reflected most conspicuously in the manner in which the steel trust is extending its system into the Middle West, where it is building three or four cities like Gary, Ind., with its wonderfully modern plant, its nearness to the ore regions of the Creat Lakes, and its favorable location at the head of the Lakes-Gulf inland waterways. On the Pacific coast, this development is seen in the growth of the large commercial cities, with their encouragement of allied domestic industries. In both the Middle West and the Pacific Coast, agriculture of all kinds will receive a boom on a larger scale than heretofore. This will mean bigger farms, more tenantry angiarm laborers; more social discontent and I. W. W. material, in fact, the industrial, proletarian character of the East will, in the next decade, be reproduced in the Middle West and the Pacific Coast at a greater rate than heretofore. Even the South will be made more industrial than at present, thanks to the Panama Canal; so that the I. W. W. is in no grave danger of being monopolized by the East, or dominated by it; especially as it is an industrial organization and not a territorial one.

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
