The hotel group would form a branch of a Culinary Workers' Local Industrial Union (if the term "culinary" is inclusive enough), which would be composed of similar branches embracing all the culinary workers of a given locality. Such a branch would include bartenders, porters, waiters, cooks, chambermaids, bell boys, clerks, mechanis, and all others necessary to the operation of the hotel. Hortors! "Menials" and "aristocrats" in the same union! Extactly. "One Big Union" of hotel workers! No scabbing of one division upon another in a strike.
