The "syndicate" as the union is called, is not essentially different in form from our well-known "trade union," while being much better calapted to the existing stage of industrial development in France et al. Syndicalism has a definite program, and works out its problems through organization at the point of production. The "rubbing of shoulders" of anarchists with organized syndicalists, has resulted in a modified philosophy miscalled "anarcho-syndicalism" which attempts the application of a revolutionary program and tactics to the trade uniof movement. We insist that the term is a misnomer—there is no such thing as "anarcho-syndicalism" since the anarchist must remain outside the trade union movement in order to be properly labeled as such, and ceases to be an danarchist when he becomes in all sincerity an active syndicalist. The use or advocacy of "direct action" methods such as the strike, boycott, sabotage, and other forms of "dealing directly with the employer through the union of workers" does not make pone an anarchist. These methods originated with the workers in industry not in the massive brains of middle class "intellectuals." Whatever "spirit" individual anarchists may have brought to the syndicates dinas its complement in the modified spirit of the individual anarchists who have become syndicalists.
