PROGRESS OF THE STRIKE

From Many Places And Many Angles—Is There a Wage-Reduction Struggle Coming?

HAVE EMPLOYERS CHANGED POLICY? A new upward climb of wages prosperity wages reached its greatest height?

Of Capitalists Have No Effect On Anthracite Miners—Good Flynn Meetings Held.

St. Paul, Minn., June 16.—A strike is on at this time in Northern Minnesota among the miners. They are demanding \$3.00 a day for 8 hours and are organizing into the I. W. O. The strikers are mostly I. W. O. members and Austrians and the sentiment is fine for the I. W. O.

Several organizers were sent immediately to the strike scene and Arthur Boose, James Gilly and others were arrested there yesterday on trumped up charges in order to try and break the strike. A lawyer who had been engaged to look after their cases has disappeared from the ground. More organizers are being sent into the strike district. One thousand miners already lined up and the rest will as soon as we can get more supplies on the ground. Now this will be a big strike and should get all the support from all members through the I. W. O. that possibly can be given.

The capitalist press has hit upon a new method of deluding its readers regarding the I. W. W. First, it prints some wild stories regarding I. W. W. strikers. These are followed up by other stories in which the terrible monster is effectively subdued. The idea, evidently, is to disgust the workers with the I. W. W. in the belief that it is merely a no-account windfall.
