"I observe in the Official Bulletin of December 28rd, Comrade Berlyn's note stating that he approved of my proposition anent Bloody Sunday,' but that he is not reported in favor, probably because his note was received after the vote closed. As 'no action taken' was reported on the former vote, through the vote of Comrade Berlyn and myself, not being received within the regular prescribed time, I would therefore repeat my former proposition relative to the National office placing speakers in the field for from two to three months for the purpose of raising funds for the Russian revolution. I would add to this that locals be charged a stated sum for such speakers, such amount to be sufficient to cover the expense to the National office.

"Of course, the proposition to have demonstrations held on January 22nd, as submitted by Comrade Hillquit and now being acted upon by the N. E. C., will necessarily take precedence over the proposition regarding the touring of speakers, but the National office, through the latter method, can also do much to make effective the call for celebrating 'Bloody Sunday."

"Finally, I hope that no straining over minor technicalities will be permitted to stand in the way of prompt and timely action by the Socialist party in behalf of the struggling Russian proletariat."

Resolved, That we, the Committee on State and Municipal Program recommend that in the constitution of the party, provisions should be made for the organization of a committee on State and Municipal Affairs, with a permanent secretary, whose office shall be at the Hational Headquarters, and recommend that the following provision become a part of the constitution of the party:

Section A. There shall be elected at each national convention a committee of nine on State and Municipal Affairs.

Section A. There shall be elected at each national convention a committee of nine on State and Municipal Affairs.

Sec. B. The Committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring among its members during the interim between the meeting of the national conventions.

Sec. C. The object of the Committee shall be that of an advisory committee to suggest lines of activity to local and state officers and to assist them in securing data and in the preparation of resolutions, ordinances, bills and such other legal measures for the carrying out of the Socialist program as may be necessary, and also to advise the party, where it may desire, in the preparation of local and state programs.

Sec. D. The Committee on State and Municipal Affairs shall, on the approval of the Executive Committee of the Mational Committee, elect a permanent secretary, whose office shall be at the Mational Headquarters, and his compensation shall be fixed by the Executive Committee.

Sec. E. The expenses of the Committee on State and Municipal Affairs while attending its meetings shall be paid from the National Treasury.

2-PREAMBLE FOR STATE PRO-GRAM.

1. The principles of the Socialist platform cannot be carried into full effect while the Socialist Party is a minority party. The work of the Socialist members of the state legislatures and local administrations under present circumstances must necessarily be confiened to effort, for the realizing of such limited measures as they may be able to wrest from the capitalist majority for the benefit of and in the interest of the working class. In presenting and advocating such measures the Socialist members of the state legislatures and of local administrations must bear in mind the fact that they are fighting on a parliamentary basis the class struggle, which brought into existence the Socialist movement and the Socialist Party. They must defend the interests of the working class against the encroachments of the capitalist class, and decline in their parliamentary work any trading with the capitalist representatives for favorable legislation. Socialists in state legislatures and local administrations may well be guided by the advice of the permanent committee on State and Municipal Program provided by the Mational Constitution of the Socialist Party.

Proposed National Party Referendum

BY LOCAL SEATTLE, WASH.

Whereas, The National Convention of the Socialist Party held in Chicago, May, 1904. provided for a Party Bulletin; and Whereas, Said convention did not provide

practical method to distribute same; and Whereas, For that reason the bulletin has become an expensive incumbrance to the party; and

Whereas, Even with all its faults the bulletin has demonstrated its usefulness to the membership; therefore be it

Resolved, By Local Seattle Socialist Party that the national constitution be amended by inserting the following: 1. That the official Bulletin be changed

to a Weekly Socialist Newspaper. 2. That said paper be called "The Socialist Bulletin," and be the official paper of the Socialist Party of the United States.

The affairs of this paper shall be administered by a managing board, its executive committee, the Party convention and general vote of the membership.

4. The managing board shall consist of one member of the Socialist Party in good standing from each state or territory.

5. The members of this board shall be elected by referendum vote of and from the membership of the state or territory which they respectively represent, whose terms of office shall be one year.

6. The members of this board shall be subject to removal by referendum vote of their respective states or territories.

7. The work of this board shall be done by correspondence. 8. The duties of this board shall be to receive and pass upon all reports and ac-

tions of the executive committee. The executive committee of this board shall consist of five members of the Socialist Party in good standing, elected by the board of managers from nominations made by the different locals in and within a radius of fifty miles of Chicago, Ill.

10. The executive committee shall meet at least once in each month; it shall supervise and direct the work of the Editor transact all business of the board and adopt its own rules of procedure.

The Editor shall be employed by the executive committee.

12. The executive committee shall transmit copies of the minutes of all meetings to each member of the managing board and all its acts shall be subject to revision by said

The term of office of the executive committee shall be one year.

Article VI of the Constitution.

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of seven members, but no more than three members of the said committee shall be elected from one state. The term of office of the mem-bers of the Executive Committee shall be

one year.

"The members of the Executive Committee shall be elected by referendum vote. The call for nominations shall be issued on the 15th day of November in each year. Each local shall be entitled to nominate seven candidates. Twenty days shall be allowed for prominations. days shall be allowed for nominations, ten for acceptances and declinations, and forty-five for the referendum. The seven candidates receiving the highest votes shall be elected. Vacancies shall be filled in a similar manner. Members of the Executive Committee may be recalled by a referendum vote, in the manner provided for referendum; in Article ner provided for referendums in Article XI hereof, except that in such cases the initiative shall not be held open for thirty days, but shall be sent out immediately."
Sec. 2. "The Executive Committee

2. Every member of the National Executive Committee must be given notice in the call of the object of the meeting.

3. Only such business may be trans-acted at the Special Meeting as is speci-

fied in the call. All motions or other matter submitted to the National Executive Committee, for action by correspondence, be reported upon by the National Secretary immediately after all the members have been heard from, and not later than ten days after the submission of such matters,

ven if all the members are not heard from.

Note.—There is no rule or set time for the adoption, by the National Committee, of the actions of the National Executive Committee.

The practice has been, that such parts not effected by a motion or amendment at the expiration of twenty-one days from date of publication, were adopted. Laws Affecting the National Com-

mittee, as Amended. Article IV. of the Constitution. Section 1. Each organized state or territory shall be represented on the Nation Committee by one member and by an additional member for every one thousand members or major fraction thereof in good standing in the party. For the purpose of determining the representation to which each state or territory may be entitled, the National Secretary shall compute at the beginning of each year the average dues-paying membership of such state or territory for the preceding year.

Sec. 2. The members of this commit-tee shall be elected by referendum vote of and from the membership of the states or territories which they respectively represent. Their term of office shall not be more than two years. The members of the National Committee shall be subject to removal by referendum vote of their

respective states.
Sec. 3. The National Committee shall meet whenever it shall deem it neces-

sary to do so.
Sec. 4. Expenses of the National Committeemen in attending meetings shall be paid from the National treasury. Sec. 5. Between the sessions of the National Committee, all its business shall be transacted by correspondence. Sec. 6. The National Committee shall

adopt its own rules of procedure not inconsistent with the provisions of this

Rules for National Committee Refer-

endums.

1. Any National Committeeman may

make a motion. The same shall be put to the National Committee, no second being required.

2. When a National Committeeman makes a motion by correspondence it shall be published in the next weekly Bulletin. A period of ten days shall then be permitted to elapse before the ballots for the said motion are sent out. During these ten days, any National Committeeman may send in his comment on said motion. If the comment exceeds one hundred words, it shall be filed for reference, but not published. Otherwise, it shall be sent out along with the ballots. When sending in the ballots, the National Committeemen may file com-

lots. When sending in the ballots, the National Committeemen may file comments for reference if they so desire but such comments shall not be published. Note.—That part of Rule 2 which appears in Italics has been abrogated by the adoption August 23 of National Committee motion. No. 26 as follows: "I move a reconsideration of Motion No. 18." Motion No. 18 provided that comment by members of the National Committee should not be published in the Official Monthly Bulletin.

3. The National Secretary may declare a motion out of order if the same is in conflict with the constitution of the party, or the rules of the National Com-

party, or the rules of the National Com-

mittee.

4. A motion to lay a motion on the table shall be out of order.

5. "Motions to amend, defer, post-pone or declare a motion out of order, shall be, with the exception of the com-ments by the originators of such motions, not commentable, must reach the National Office before ballots of original motion are sent out and ballots for such motion with comments shall be sent out with the ballots of original motion. Should more than one amendment be submitted, which, if adopted, would be conflicting, the one receiving the most votes shall be declared adopted."

6. In order that all states securing additional National Committeemen may have an equal consortiuity to accurate

have an equal opportunity to acquire their additional representation at the same time, the call for nominations for the election of National Committeemen in each state shall be issued after the ap-

portionment of National Committeemen has been made by the National Secretary. 7. No-motion declaratory of the principles or the policy of the party shall be submitted unless seconded by one-sixth of the members of the National Committee.

8. A National Committeeman may withdraw a motion made by himself before it is submitted, provided it is not seconded.

9. A motion ordering an inquiry into the state of the organization in any state or territory shall also set a date for the termination of such inquiry. If such motion is adopted, no other motion re-lating to such inquiry shall be in order before the determination of such inquiry unless seconded by one-sixth of the mem-

bers of the National Committee.

10. When a referendum vote on the election of committees, etc., submitted to the National Committeemen does not result in a choice on the second ballot all names but the two highest shall be dropped when more than two candidates remain and only one is to be elected; all but three dropped where two are to be chosen, and so on, allowing of one candi-date in excess of actual number to be elected before a third and final ballot is

ordered.

11. Whenever a protest is lodged with the National Secretary against any com-rade holding any position under the ju-risdiction of the National Committee or against any comrade nominated for any such position, the National Secretary shall, before submitting a protest to the members of the committee for their consideration, give the comrade against whom the protest is directed, opportunity to submit a statement in his or her behalf should he or she desire to do so. In the case of protests against nominees for any position, this right shall belong to the nominator, whether such nominator be a or a division of the party duly recognized as having the right to nominate candi-

dates.

12. Whenever any motion is submitted to the National Committee which affects the standing of an organization or member in the Socialist party, reasonable opportunity to make a statement shall be granted to such organization or

member before the ballots are sent out to the members of the Committee, and such statement shall be sent out to-gether with the ballots. All evidence must be sent through the National of-

13. If, when the ballots for any motion are sent out, any state shall be three months or more in arrears in its reports or dues, the committeemen from that state shall not be entitled to vote on such

motion.

14. No motion to suspend or expel an organized state or territory shall be submitted unless seconded by one-sixth of the members of the committee.
