The De Leonites have habitually denounced us to the workingmen as "Bourgeois" and "midule-class" and non - Socialist, though they know that our platform and teachings and membership are strictly class conscious. The result of these tactics is seen in the election returns. They have made workingmen believe that Socialists are divided among themselves, and hostile to one another, as well as given the impression by their harsh talk that Socialists are a rough and unreasonable set of men

The Socialists of Seattle are handicaped by the De Leonite section and the De Leonite methods, which have held this ground for 'several years, while the S. D. P. is scarcely a year old yet in Seattle.

It will take us at least another year to make workingmen see that Socialists are neither unreasonable nor indecent-that is, to overcome the false impression of Socialism which has been made during the last three years 3 by the savage methods of the De Leon e., S. L. P.

No one dreamed that our Western Central Oracle and Mentor, would descend to the groveling and degrading level of doing business on modern methods, but it seems we were deceived. Without loss of time he sent postal cards to a large number of business men, informing them that they would be solicited for an ad, in the Labor Day Program, and requested them not to patronize any other program. This card bore the signature of W. H. Middleton, chairman of La bor Day committee, not W. H. Middleton, business manager of the Un ion Printing Co., thus giving the im pression that business would be done in the name of organized labor. The solicitors canvassed the business men for patronage, and to nearly all of them represented that it was for the benefit of the Labor Temple, or the Western Central Labor Union. To still further impress the business men that the job was being done by the Western Central Labor Union, for the benefit of organized labor, the solicitor produced a contract signed, W. H. Middleton. Chairman Labor Day Comittee, instead of W. H. Middleton, Business Manager of the Union Printing

In fact, organized labor was used as a cat's paw to scoop a few hot chestnuts into private pockets. They may be longer cooling off than was anticipated.

It has been conclusively proven that these charges are true. I say conclusively proven, and I know whereof I affirm. Will someone please rise and tell wherein The Socialist has made a false charge against the clever and astute trio, that haunt the sanctum of the Union Printing Co? These charges are true, lamentably true, and the consequence thereof is the volcanic eruption on page 4 of the Union Record.

The Western Central granted the Union Printing Co. the privilege of getting out the program for ten per cent, of the net receipts, a fair business proposition. But they did not give them the privilege of soliciting ads. on the grounds that it would benefit organized labor, which was done, notwithstanding affidavits to the contrary.

Is it reasonable to suppose that if this business had been done in the name of the Union Printing Co. they would have realized the liberal patronage that was accorded them? We Know from an abundance of evidence now collected that they would not. As the situation now the Union Printing Co. stands convicted obtaining of stand profits through questionable methods. In as far as organized labor sanctions this transaction, in so far organized labor invites public distrust and suspicion. If the labor organizations desire to perpetrate their existence, if they wish to stand before the public is honest and honorable, they must that the business people of Seattle get to work and purge themselves of had responded very liberally toward all unholy combinations that reflect discredit upon their name.
