Thousands of California Citizens Demand Bail for Western Federation Officials

Hon. Frank. J. Smith,

City of Caldwell, State of Idaho.

We, the undersigned, residents of Los Angeles county, Calif., being citizens of the United States, and in pursuance of Article (1) One, Amendments of Constitution of said United States, and of a right inherent, as well as vested in us by said Constitution, hereby, by these presents, do protest against your most flagrant violation of said Constitution, in your dealings with the persons of the officials of the Western Federation of Miners, (namely our fellow citizens Chas. Moy er, William D. Haywood and George Pettibone.

Furthermore, we protest against unwarranted and unconstitutional usurpation of power by established authority in the State of Idaho, as witnessed by unconstitutional and illegal procedure of arrest and kidnapping of said citizens of a sovereign state by and through assumed author-mond ave.

Furthermore, we protest against the unwarranted and illegal continued imprisonment of ave said citizens in plain violation of Article (6) Six, Amendments to the Constitution of the United mond ave. States.

Therefore, in defense of said Constitution, and by virtue of the supreme power of the land being vested in the citizens thereof, and in defense of our rights and liberties, we demand that aveyou proceed to dismiss the pending illegal cases against these, our fellow citizens, and that they may be permitted to return to their own resident state and to their duties as citizens thereof.

We further demand that if the State of Idaho has aught against these citizens, that it proceed by due form of law and in strict conformity to the Constitution of these United States of America, as provided in the Constitution thereof. Otherwise, we can but feel that the present unwarranted usurpation of power and exercise of tyranny by officials in the State of Idaho is an attempt to establish a tyranny and fix new disabilities and burdens on the people.


