

gain their livelihood by living off the unholy earnings of fallen women, were thrown in jail for not paying their head tax. I had spoken to those people, and they, not knowing who I was, or what I was after, told many things not generally known. These degenerate, almost human beings are allowed to remain in the city by the hundreds in consideration of some woman paying \$10.00 a month to some one who represents the executive department of Seattle's City Reform Administration.

#### SOME WOMAN BAILED HIM OUT.

Another night while in jail, five of these desirable citizens were arrested, but in a few hours all 5 were out on bail; some woman having put up the necessary \$10.00 bail to secure the release of her "companion" in each instance, while I laid in jail refused ball from 8 in the evening until 2 the next afternoon for the crime of speaking on the streets.

#### OTHERS EQUALLY GUILTY.

But the worst is yet to come. These are not the only people who are deriving tribute from the sale of virtue in Seattle's Market. Every taxpayer, every citizen, in fact, the community as a whole, is engaged in the same disreputable business. And this is how it happens;

The city of Seattle wants a business administration and is getting it. And a business administration means-get the money. One way they get it is to license every prostitute in the city for \$10.00 a month, and every keeper of a house of prostitution for \$100.00 a month, and by thus doing save \$6,000.00 a month to the Christian taxpayers of Seattle.

But the women pay \$12.00 a month to those who are collecting this worse than blood money, and unless this barefaced robbery of the people is discontinued. I would advise some public spirited desirable Christian eitizen of this Queen City to send to San Francisco after Heney and Burns and bring them up here to find out who is robbing them of THE TWO DOLLARS. This little item alone of \$2.00 per prostitute amounts to \$1,200.00 a month, a little leak, it is true, but one that should be remedied.

#### POLICEMEN PROCURERS.

Every evil once well on its way brings other evils in its train, and one of the results of this rotten practice is to turn the police and detective force from its legitimate work of detecting crime and apprehending criminals to the mean and disreputable work of procuring harlots to increase the number of residents of the tenderloin

The new scale is 1 woman \$10, 10 women, \$1,000.00, or 1 policeman's pay for a month. From a business point of view this beats an investment in Seattle City Real Estate.

This is not fiction. This is a fact. A certain part of the city is set aside, and upon the payment of a certain sum into the treasury of the City of Seattle, the persons who violate the moral commandment are immune from arrest.

But outside that district the police are sent out to spy and watch and drive into the shearing sheds any whom they can find.

From this devilish practice many women who would reform and settle down, if not dragged into the police court in this inhuman way, are driven to prostitution

For it must be remembered that these women are not prostitutes, but working girls. The real prostitute never finds herself in the police court unless she may stray into the street in a drunken condition

Another product of reformed Seattle is the extension of its chain gang

Under the present conditions of the state and nation, with hundreds of thousands thrown out of employment, most of them honest, hard working men, the utmost discretion should be shown in imprisoning them for being

But here the opposite course is taken. This is an "honest" business administration, and the poor tax payer must be protected.

Hungry men out of a job, cheeks hollow and clothes showing the result of sleeping out of doors, are an inconvenience and the desirable element who pay the taxes must be protected from such sights. So in bunches they are rounded up-in butches convicted, and in bunches they are put on the chain gang. The intent is to so terrorize these poor devils that they will keep away from Seattle.

Wise course! But all wise people do not live in Seattle. Mayor Moore and one or two others do, but in other cities are other men just as wise, just as unscrupulous and unprincipled as he. While Seattle is trying to terrorize these men, every other city in the country is doing the same and so the result they wish to obtain from their brutality is lost. Instead of getting rid of what they look on as their undesirable element, they are only planting deep down in the hearts of honest men a hate which some day may break forth in flames when driven by the pangs of hunger.

I have lain among them in this jail in the 18 times I have now been arrested. These men are not criminals, they are not bad men, they have hearts, they have a sense of shame, in fact so strong that one term on a chain gang will often turn them forever into enemies of all government.

I stood and watched them day after day, those men in stature, children in intellect-I watched them with their sullen brows. I saw them struck in the face without retaliation... I heard their chains clanking as they filed out, out on the street to do the work in brooding, they would willingly perform with smiles for a place to sleep, three meals a day and the delusion

These men are not sinners-but sinned against, undesirable victims of desirable rascals. They have made the nation what it is, they have taken a big wilderness and in fifty years changed it into the foremost industrial and agricultural organization upon the earth.

And their pay is chains and slavery. The chain that is fastened on the leg of some poor devil in that fail tonight reaches out and fastens on every citizen in this city. The misery of those men in irons working in the rain underclad, soaked to the skin, chilled to the bone, is an indictment against any community strong enough to damn it. Talk about Christianity! Talk about civilization!

Damn your Christianity. Damn your civilization, while you, the repre-

sentative desirable citizens of this city, can go to your cheerful homes and rest in peace and comfort while your fellow men in misery and want are lying in your jails and working on your streets. In my life I have had many disappointments. I have seen my family one

by one taken away until I was left alone; I have lost without a whimper, everything that was near and dear to me, everything of value, the last decent rag on my back, but the worst cut of all came in this city when a man, a union man, such as I had always been, a man high up in the Ranks of Labor, a secretary of a union in this city, went before the city council in Seattle and pleaded not for the abolition of the chain gang, not for better treatment for them, not for 50 cents or a dollar a day for their work when their time was up so as to give them a fresh start, not to demand that this work this chain gang was doing be given to those men who were out of work and needed it so badly, no, but to petition that council to give him more guards so he could work three chain gangs in place of one.
