



Another Way of Looking at It. In the spring election of March, 1902 in an exciting city campaign calling out 13,000 votes, the Socialist Party polled for Mayor 312 votes, or less than

21/2 per cent.

2½ per cent.

Now, only eight months later, in a dull campaign calling out only 11,000 votes, the Socialist Party polls 616 votes for the head of the ticket, almost exactly doubling its vote in less than one year and more than doubling its percentage, rising from less than per cent to more than 5½ per cent.

Still Another Way.

No capitalist party casts as many votes this election as in the city elecion last spring. But the Socialists have doubled their vote while the others actually decreased.

Socialist Vote in King County

In the Debs campaign of 1900, this county, of which Seattle is the centre, county, of which Seattle is the centre, cast 269 votes for the Socialist Party, being less than both Pierce and Whatcom counties. This year the number is increased to 929, the county outside Seattle casting 313 votes. About half these 313 are from the suburbs of Seattle, Ballard 44, Renton 31, Duwamish 30, South Park 21, South Seattle 14.

The S. L. P. receive 115 votes, in ounty outside Seattle, making their to-

tal in King county 295.

Adding together the S. P. vote of 929 and the S. L. P. vote of 295, gives 1,224 Socialist votes in King county, or a little over 7 per cent of the entire

We are not attempting to give the detailed vote of Seattle and King county this week. Next week we shall have the precise vote. We are only able to give the totals by having secured access to the polling books earlier than any other paper in the city. The largest votes in this county besides those already named were cast in Issaquah 15, Leary 11, Meridian 9, North Bend 7, Preston, Richmond, Sammamish and 7, Preston, Richmond, Sammamish and Avondale, 5 each.
