It has merely resulted in a transformation of these utilities from private capitalism to collective capitalism, with the capitalist class still in control.

"We therefore declare that only under working class control of municipalities can municipal ownership be beneficial to the working class. THE QUESTION IN A NUTSHELL.

To sum up.
The Municipal Ownership proposed by Tom L. Johnson would retain the municipalities in the control of the corpupt, inefficient and moribund Democratic party in the interest of the middle class. It would destroy the solidarity of the working class by placing one section in a position to negate the demands and aspirations of all other sections. It would rehabilitate the middle dash by enabling it to increase rents and thus tend to lower the sandard of living for the working class. And it would, through these means, retard the development of the working class movement which seeks the complete freedom of the working class from capitalist class rule.

WHAT SOCIALISTS WOULD DO.

Under working class control of the state and municipality the enforcement and enactment of regulations which would tend to uplift and benefit the working class could be the first consideration.

Socialists would care for and protect the workers in all industries, so that the working class could be equipped for "its historic mission to abolish the wage slave system and thus achieve its emancipation from the brutal rule of capitalism."
